Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc - was founded in 1969 by 19-year-old Murray Higgins, of Blockhouse Bay. The owner of a 1948 Mk IV, Murray placed an advertisement in the Public Notices section of the New Zealand Herald inviting Jaguar owners and enthusiasts to a meeting. The result on April 16 1969, was the formation of what is now known as the Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc.

The first event, on June 9 1969, was a fun rally and gymkhana, followed by lunch at the Puhoi Hotel (for the princely sum of \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children) and an evening "get together" in the Architects' Clubrooms on Symonds Street.

The Club has grown steadily since its humble beginnings and is now one of the largest single marque car clubs in Auckland. The Club's main aim is to foster interest in and promote owning, driving, maintaining and restoring Jaguar cars. To this end, a wide range of events are arranged on a monthly basis. Although some events are competitive, all are social and family and friends of members are welcome to join in.

Another important person in the Club's (and Jaguar's) history was Lofty England. Lofty, who managed Jaguar's successful competitions department in the 50's, was the Club's Patron until his death in 1995. Norm Dewis (Jaguar's chief test engineer 1952 to 1985) was Patron until his passing in 2019. The position of Patron is now being filled by lan Callum (CBE). Ian was Jaguar's Design Director for 20 years and was instrumental in a full transformation of the saloons and sports cars, the launch of the SUVs, and the revolutionary I-Pace.

The Club's financial year is from August 1st to July 31st and the AGM is held in October/November. New members will receive a copy of the current magazine which will give them a list of office holders (who are elected at each AGM). A copy of the Club's constitution can be found on the website: www.jaguardriversclub.co.nz.

Each major centre in NZ now has its own independent Jaguar car club, around 14 in all, ranging from the small with a dozen members up to Auckland with over 300.

Brick bay sculpture trail

n a wet rainy day 27 people gathered at the BP Service Centre at Silverdale for a coffee then following a briefing from our Club President Dean Wright, we set off towards Snell's Beach to the Brick Bay Vineyard to walk their Sculpture Trail.

The weather had cleared by the time we arrived, so we set off to walk the trail. An interesting and varied collection of outdoor sculptures are placed throughout the 2km trail, set thoughtfully and artfully into the landscape. It started at a large pond full of waterlilies with 2 beautiful stainless steel artworks gleaming in the water. Each sculpture was listed in the trail map with a brief description of the artist's intentions and meaning of the work, plus the price. Outdoor sculpture entails considerable expenses for artists and the Brick Bay Sculpture Trust assists artists with meeting some of those costs.

The works are set in a variety of landscapes, from native forest to open pasture, lakes, swamp, and vineyards. The undulating terrain makes for an interesting walk. Several times we looked hard to see the artwork in the trees as it was so well placed. We all had our favourite pieces and it's no exaggeration to say that our minds were opened to a variety of genres, from aural works, to works in stone, cement, steel, bronze and wood. Bells and even objects like the giant head from the TV series Xena, which had been turned into a 'man cave' or 'sleeping nook'.

The additional loop walk through a kauri tree grove was a special treat, as was being followed by a fantail. The Sculpture Trail is a lovely walk that we recommend to everyone and well-priced at \$10 for seniors!

We then jumped back into our cars and ambled several kilometres down the road to the Salty Dog Pub in Snell's Beach where we enjoyed a delicious Sunday lunch, a drink and caught up with each other's news.

Thanks to Club Captain Steve Heaney for making the arrangements for this outing. A great day had by all that attended.



Barriers research says poverty and lack of self-confidence main barriers for at-risk youth in gaining driver's license

ore needs to be done to help prepare at-risk youth for employment according to the head of a youth charity, following the release of new data showing many young Kiwis risk imprisonment driving without

New figures released by Silver Fern Motorsport Charitable Trust, a not-for-profit organisation which provides free learners driver's license training, shows 40% of the hundreds of youth who are referred to their programme drive without a license and more than a quarter (28%) of these drive regularly - between once a week and every day.

Ted Jarvis, chairman of the charity says too many young New Zealanders are driving on our roads each day without a license, placing themselves and other road users at risk.

"Aside from the safety risks, driving without a license can lead to a charge of Driving While Forbidden, and a conviction under this charge can carry a fine and/or imprisonment of three months. For a third or subsequent conviction,



this could see a prison term of up to two years.

"Many of the young Kiwis that are referred to us are at a crossroads in their life, and the primary motivation for wanting to get their license is to improve their chances of being employed or to access training.

"Even a short sentence in prison can set them down a path that is very hard to come back from.

"Once they are inside the first thing they will do is get some protection so they join a gang. Then when they come out of prison they get a call from the gang saying 'we looked after you, now it is your turn to return the favour' and suddenly they're in that cycle and they become a career criminal.

"For many young kids their first interaction with the courts and youth justice is from driving - it starts with a driving offence and leads to other things.

"One of the interesting things we found out is that the kids say 'now we have our driver's license we don't have to run from the cops'," he says.

Jarvis says their research shows there are a number of barriers which prevent some Kiwis from getting their license independently.

"While literacy issues do form a barrier for many students, the

primary reasons given for not having sat their driver's license previously are lack of finances and poor self-confidence.

"We know that we are the ambulance at the bottom of the cliff for most of these kids and so what we need to offer goes beyond help passing a driver's test.

"If we can get them referred to our course, we stay with the young person until they get their license. To date, we have a 100% success rate. From there, we look at what else they need to get into a career.

"Many don't have a personal ID, so we help them get an IRD number, bank account, birth certificate and any other support they need to get started.

"We had one of our students last year who told us how much the birth certificate meant to her, she said to me 'this is the first time in my life I actually know who I am'.

"Ultimately a successful intervention at this point is going to help get these kids back on track and keep them out of the court system," he says.

Jarvis says a recent equipment donation of tablets from The Trusts will allow them to expand their service throughout the North Island.



The Trusts CEO Allan Pollard says the charity provides an invaluable service in the region and the longer-term benefits of their work in the community cannot be underestimated.

"One of the things that stood out for us was that the relatively modest donation of computing equipment will bring a level of mobility to the charity that will see hundreds of at-risk Kiwi youth given the foundation for a more positive pathway in life.

"What many of us overlook in our daily commute is the freedom provided by having legal access to a vehicle for transportation and for improving our productivity at work.

"The work of the team at Silver Fern MotorSport Charitable Trust is giving a fundamentally important sense of self-confidence to a group of young Kiwis who otherwise might end up caught up in our prison system and we are immensely proud to be able to support their efforts in the community," he says.



Warbirds On parade open day

he much-anticipated dawning of Sunday 6th December finally arrived, and it was time for my visiting New Yorker son-in-law Sam and I to start up the 1960 XK150S, fill up on a Macadee breakky bun and hit the road for Ardmore Airport.

We turned off Hamlin Road at 0700 sharp, just as our stalwart Warbirds man Larry Price was ushering the first couple of cars into a convenient layby on Harvard Lane to await the full complement of 28 Jaguars registered for the invitation club display, right beside the warbirds stand. Best of all the weather was glorious with only a breath of wind. Perfect flying weather.

As if the glorious gathering of shiny Jags was not enough of a sight to behold as the crowds of spectators drove past our lineup, an even more wonderful treat awaited us up at No.4 Hangar.

By 0750hrs all 28 Jaguars had arrived; well ahead of the 8 am deadline for no further vehicle movements on the aircraft stands. Larry led the gathered throng of cats in his D-Type, having quipped that he promised not to exceed 100kph! In fact, we progressed at a very sedate pace to ensure no lost stragglers en route.

We were quickly lined up in two rows of 14 and by 0815 our club Display was complete, with the Jaguar Marquee providing much needed shade (and barbeque), care of the wonderful efforts of Robin O'Connor. Within minutes we were surrounded by numerous interested members of the public wanting to know about our cars and sharing great enthusiasm for our efforts as we waited for the first Airshow at 1030.

Other very interesting displays were also put on by army volunteers mocking up World War two German, British and American forces. A team of paratroopers showed off their skills controlling parachutes on the ground and a collection of original Jeeps and Land Rover's completed the period feel of these displays.

With such beautiful weather, Ardmore's runways and grass aprons were fully occupied for three extraordinary flying displays, starting with World War one fighters dogfighting in the cloudless skies. We were given a very rare glimpse of the enormous courage of these early fighting aviators! Imagine taking to the air in back 1914 in machines made of wood and canvas that owed their technology to the first powered flight just over a decade earlier.

Having said that the amazingly sophisticated radial and rotary engines we saw demonstrated were a world away from the tiny engines that powered Orville and Wilbur Wright's first 6km flight. The Wright's power plants were heavy and produced barely enough power to propel the aerofoil wing tips forward enough to generate any more than just the few metres of lift they achieved. The German Fokker Triplane on the other hand powered down the runway and launched into the air in an almost vertical climb after only a hundred or so metres at most. Its dogfight capability was legendary with so much lift from its three wings.

We saw wonderful mock dogfights between the Fokker and the Bristol. Then followed a stunning aerobatic display from the hugely powerful modern MXS; at times virtually at a standstill in the air at the top of a steep climb, hanging on its propeller driven by its spectacularly powerful engine, only to tip over backwards or to one side and plunge into a screaming dive.

We were then treated to a race between a McLaren 720S and another very fast and capable Extra aerobatic plane. The result was totally unexpected! The aeroplane was no match for the McLaren and after 3 runs up and down the runway, despite every effort of the Extra's pilot, the McLaren under launch control and with a 0-100kph time of 2.3 seconds, was nearly half a runway ahead.

After a quick lunch we were back on our seats beside the runway for Session 2 with the main Ardmore Harvard Team in the air for another breath-taking display of precision aerobatics from these now 85-year-old aircraft.

It was a very busy afternoon as we were treated to yet more spectacular flying of the Ardmore warbirds. Both single seat and twin cockpit Spitfires took off, buzzing the airfield in high-speed passes of over 300knots/350mph and doing stunning climbs turns and loops. The single seat Spitfire being expertly piloted by long time Air New Zealand 777 pilot Liz Needham.

When the third wonderful air display, complete with mock dogfights and lots of thunder flashes for effect was over, it was time to pack up and head home. What a marvellous day it was too. The memory of those glorious spine-tingling sounds of wartime radial and V12 engines filling the air, will stay with me and all those lucky people who attended for a long time to come. Again, we all counted our blessings that as a community, kiwis can gather to enjoy such fun here in our wonderful, green, and pleasant Aotearoa New Zealand.

A very big vote of thanks to the Warbirds and JDCA member - Mike Wood for creating the opportunity for Jaguar to participate in the show, and to Larry Price for his endless enthusiasm and help in organising such a great day out for the Club.

Nelson to Alexandra

fter a couple of glorious days walking and touring in the Nelson area, it was time to hit the road again. On the morning of Friday 18th Se<mark>p</mark>tember, we departed Nelson in light rain and headed for Punakaiki on the West Coast some three hours away. Today offered several highlights - driving the Buller gorge and of course, experiencing the Punakaiki rocks. Driving out of Nelson, it was now very heavily raining, we were surrounded by crops not normally seen in the North Island - hops, and lots of them. The growth of craft breweries has seen an increase in the number of plantings - and the amount of new grape plantings in and around Nelson must be seen to be believed. This was also a very early area of European settlement, so we passed several quaint old churches dating back to the mid 1800's. By now we pretty much had the road to ourselves passing through areas where the valley floors are pastural farming and the surroundings steep hillsides are forested. We passed through the Golden Downs Forest then down through the valley before climbing the infamous Hope Saddle. We really are in isolated country now, but the road is in remarkably good condition. After the recent heavy rain, the Buller River was running high with much debris floating downstream. At Murchison we stopped for coffee. Like many of these small-town cafes, the decor was average at best, but the coffee was surprisingly good and the welcome very warm and engaging. Caffeine fuelled, we headed off for the part of today's drive I was looking forward to the most, the Buller Gorge - and I was not disappointed. The road was good and the scenery nothing short of magnificent. The gorge walls are impressively steep, and the mountain tops veiled in cloud. We got the occasional glimpses of snow on the mountain tops. What a wonderful drive. Along the way we passed under a large rock overhang which had been made so to accommodate the road. Hard to imagine it all being done with pick and shovel initially. Those road labourers, navvies, my father



used to call them of which he had been one, must have had a huge work ethic to push those roads through.

On through forgotten places like Lyell and on to Inangahua, famous for being the epicentre of the May 1968 earthquake of magnitude 7.1 (the Christchurch quake of February 2011 was 6.2) and the loss of only 2 lives because it was (and still is) such a sparsely populated area. At Inangahua Junction we continued on the #6 out to the coast to find one of New Zealand's great natural wonders. We got to Punakaiki Rocks just after midday with the tide just past its peak. That timing combined with a howling cold south-westerly gale of at least 30 knots was perfect for viewing. The carpark was pretty much empty, still we rugged up to see the 'pancake' rocks and associated blow holes. While the weather was not for the faint hearted, we were amply rewarded with the display of nature's force. The wind roared as the huge waves crashed into the cavern the sea had carved out over thousands of years. The blowholes shot up fountains of spray soaking us as we eagerly waited for another plume of water to erupt. Against the background was the continually crashing waves and the occasional thunderous boom of the water in the caves beneath our feet and the earth quivering in response. Once it got too



cold and wet to bear, we retreated to the car and a very welcome hot coffee at the roadside cafe. Having got over our excitement of seeing the Punakaiki Rocks at their very best, we headed for our accommodation in the old fire station at Hokitika about an hour further down the road. Parts of the road south of Barrytown were like a corniche with towering mountains on one side and precipitous drops into the surging Tasman Sea on the other. Through Runanga and the first of several statues to the area's most famous son, former Prime Minister - Richard Seddon. Then through Greymouth and a short half hour or so run along the coast to Hokitika. Finding our accommodation with ease, we parked behind the old fire station in the area marked "firetrucks only" and went inside.

From past experience, some of these sorts of refurbishments are memorable for their quaintness and not their style or comfort, but this was not the case. The old Hokitika Fire Station is superb and a great place to stay for a day or so after such an amazing day's driving and sightseeing. It has it all - style, comfort, and with an easy walking distance to the main shopping area. A couple of drinks and I was gone, dreaming of the visual highlights of the day, what a way to end the day.

Hokitika to Franz Josef

The day dawned overcast but no evidence of rain. We went for a walk down to the mouth of the Hokitika river to watch the Whitebaiters trying to catch these elusive fish. Some were catching a small amount while others were saying the tide was wrong or the river was flowing too fast etc, etc. But we didn't miss out as, the night before, we had both enjoyed the best whitebait fritters ever made simply with duck egg - highly recommend Kitchen Cafe - literally just across the road from our 'fire station'.

As today's trip to Franz Josef was a short drive, we decided to take a run (in the car) up to the Hokitika Gorge, about 35km inland from Hokitika town itself. What a good option that turned out to be. While the road is relatively flat, sealed and well signposted along the way, the layout was a little unusual with several right-angle bends followed by straights, much like driving diagonally across a checkerboard and about as flat. Once we got there the parking was very good and signage for the walking path to the gorge all relatively new. Only a

short distance into the track we got our first glimpse of the water spilling out of the gorge and what a sight to enjoy. The water was the most beautiful glacial aqua blue with plenty of small eddies and whirlpools to give the water some texture. The colour comes from the "rock flour", very finely ground rock particles suspended in the water. We walked over the swing bridge and further onto a lookout point. The track was very well maintained which makes it even more enjoyable. But as the sky threatened to rain, we retraced our steps to the car. Luck was on our side as we found sanctuary in our dry warm car just before the rain started. If you are ever in this area, a side trip to the Hokitika Gorge is well worthwhile.

Back to Hokitika where we fuelled up and headed south to Franz Josef. At just bit under a two-hour run, the drive was easy except for one area where the road was being rebuilt after a huge slip [more like the side of a mountain] had fallen away. On the day we drove through there was next to no traffic on the road which made it even more enjoyable. I was looking forward to visiting Ross, such a little town with a huge history from gold rush days. Unfortunately, there is now very little to see and what there was, looked unloved and depressed. South of Ross the road wound through bush and patches of farmland. At Harihari we stopped for coffee which again was surprisingly good as was the baking that accompanied it. Passing through the dairy farming district of Whataroa, we then crossed through the Waitangi Forest arriving into Franz Josef. Our accommodation for the night was on the north side of town, nestled under those towering Southern Alps. After all that travelling, it's hard for me to imagine we are still north of Mt Cook. Not that we could see much of the Alps as the cloud had descended to be just below the snowline. By now the only vehicles on the road were camper vans scurrying

to find a place to roost for the night like sparrows do each evening. By an hour after sunset - the road was virtually silent.

Franz Josef to Alexandra

Opening the curtains in the morning, the clouds had vanished, and we were treated to the most magnificent view of the snow-capped Southern Alps with a bright blue sky behind them. What a treat to wake up to. With a fairly long motoring day ahead of us, we were up and off in anticipation of many spectacular sights to take in. The first part of today's journey was heading south to Haast, again about a two-hour run. You know you are heading into remote area when a sign on the outskirts of Fox Glacier township informs you there is 'no fuel for the next 140km', still we were prepared. We travelled south through large stands of mature native bush some of it right down to the road edge. The interesting thing was in this very remote area of New Zealand, you would come across a letterbox, obviously still in use on the side of the road, usually by a narrow gravel road leading to goodness knows where. There must be some hardy folks living a very self-reliant lifestyle in such remote places.

The weather started to clag in again so by the time we got to Bruce Bay we were in rain with very low cloud, so we missed the much-acclaimed views across the bay. Still we motored on and it was not until we were within 30km of Haast that there were regular signs of civilisation. At




Haast we stopped for another coffee and yet again the same result, a very warm welcome and great brew.

The Haast Pass has a special place in my soul as my father had worked on it as a young man, I don't know which part or which rock he moved but he used to regale my younger brother and I with bedtime stories about how remote it was. Also, I had driven the Pass previously in my pride and joy of the time, my Ford 105e Anglia, and remember there being some challenging climbs and descents



for my little Ford, so I was really looking forward to driving it with the power of the mighty Jaguar. The weather had improved, and the road was all but dry, still with very little traffic. I was also looking forward to taking a photo of our XK8 at the Gates of Haast just for memory sake. The drive was beautiful and while we had read there could be holdups of up to half an hour due to roadworks, we never came across them. We also never came across the Gates of Haast or the challenging hill climbs and descents, maybe the Jaguar had flattened them all out. Before we knew it, we had the shores of Lake Wanaka on our righthand



side indicating we had passed the Pass.

Now into Central Otago the scenery quickly changed. Gone was the low cloud that kept the rain forest so lush, replaced with clear blue skies. majestic but oh so barren mountains harbouring the long narrow lakes of Wanaka and shortly followed by Hawea. We finally leave SH6 which we had been on since leaving Nelson. Our turn on to Highway 8a took us across to #8 heading down the eastern side of man-made Lake Dunstan. What a stunning road to drive. About thirty minutes after Cromwell we were at Alexandra and well settled in the old-renovated post office, our resting spot for the next few days. We had travelled a touch over 370km for the day - very enjoyable driving at the wheel of our very enjoyable XK8.

Classic Jaguar book project for 100th year of Jaguar origins



2022 will be 100 years since Jaguar can claim its earliest beginnings - when William Lyons and business partner William Walmsley founded the Swallow Sidecar Company in Blackpool, England, in late 1922. A book about classic Jaguars in New Zealand is now being worked on as a highlight project for the centenary year celebrations.

Post-war New Zealand was the furthest export market from the Jaguar Coventry works and combined with Australia, made for a significant selling market. In earlier years when car prices were high and overseas funds were required to purchase new vehicles, the New Zealand car fleet, was well-maintained with older quality cars usually kept in excellent condition. Hence the good number of classic Jaguars in New Zealand, and some amongst the best in the world.

Recognising the importance of the 100th year of origins got me thinking about writing a book about classic Jaguars in New Zealand and having it ready for launch in early 2022. The concept of the book is for large format and hard cover of high quality with about 300 pages. The text will begin with an overview of S.S./Jaguar history in the UK and here in New Zealand. The main feature of the book will be the profiling of about 45 New Zealand cars from the early 1930s to about 1990; six pages per car with about 10 photographs and 750-word profiles about each car and its owner's experiences. In addition, there will be features throughout the book on a wide variety of associated stories from NZ Jaguar restoration companies and their amazing work to NZ assembled Jaguar cars and museums that display Jaguars and a list of all NZ Jaguar car clubs.

A professional photographer with considerable motoring experience has already been engaged and his superb work with more than 500 photographs will complement the text and car profiles that I am working on. He is estimating about two hours work photographing each car and I estimate about a similar time writing each draft car profile. This landmark Jaguar publication will be a substantial work and a high-quality publication will be achieved with the ready cooperation of Jaguar car owners and many other individuals and organisations/businesses assisting. I am working in a voluntary capacity on this project helped by my 30 years' experience of researching, writing, and helping to publish about 15 books on aspects of New Zealand aviation and social history.

The book will be published by a charitable trust and is a not-for-profit project. Already a number of generous club members have made donations and our club committee is currently processing the best way it can assist too. In the meantime, how can you help?

- Research has involved reading all the Jaguar books and magazines I can lay my hands on. Has any club member got a copy of the 2004 John Clucas/Terry McGrath book or the Norman Dewis biography?
- Period photographs of Jaguars are sought from the 1940s to 1980s. Do you have any? Especially cars in interesting contexts like when brand new, at the racetrack, on a picnic with family etc.
- Can you consider making a tax-deductible donation to the book project or helping with interest-free bridging finance?
