Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc - was founded in 1969 by 19-year-old Murray Higgins, of Blockhouse Bay. The owner of a 1948 Mk IV, Murray placed an advertisement in the Public Notices section of the New Zealand Herald inviting Jaguar owners and enthusiasts to a meeting. The result on April 16 1969, was the formation of what is now known as the Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc.

A long and proud

history since 1969

The first event, on June 9 1969, was a fun rally and gymkhana, followed by lunch at the Puhoi Hotel (for the princely sum of \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children) and an evening "get together" in the Architects' Clubrooms on Symonds Street.

The Club has grown steadily since its humble beginnings and is now one of the largest single marque car clubs in Auckland. The Club's main aim is to foster interest in and promote owning, driving, maintaining and restoring Jaguar cars. To this end, a wide range of events are arranged on a monthly basis. Although some events are competitive, all are social and family and friends of members are welcome to join in.

Another important person in the Club's (and Jaguar's) history was Lofty England. Lofty, who managed Jaguar's successful competitions department in the 50's, was the Club's Patron until his death in 1995. Norm Dewis (Jaguar's chief test engineer 1952 to 1985) was Patron until his passing in 2019. The position of Patron is now being filled by Ian Callum (CBE). Ian was Jaguar's Design Director for 20 years and was instrumental in a full transformation of the saloons and sports cars, the launch of the SUVs, and the revolutionary I-Pace.

The Club's financial year is from August 1st to July 31st and the AGM is held in October/November. New members will receive a copy of the current magazine which will give them a list of office holders (who are elected at each AGM). A copy of the Club's constitution can be found on the website: www.jaguardriversclub.co.nz.

Each major centre in NZ now has its own independent Jaguar car club, around 14 in all, ranging from the small with a dozen members up to Auckland with over 300.

I wish to thank all those people that helped to put this edition together and hope you enjoy the wonderful reads.



Footnote: The Legend of the Fall is not a secret anymore.

In Māori, "mauku" refers to a type of small, native fern. Picture the lush vegetation clinging to the banks of the stream, the delicate fronds of the mauku ferns thriving in the damp, shaded environment near the falls.

The Mauku Waterfall, therefore, could be poetically understood as "the waterfall where the mauku ferns grow."

The place names like Mauku are more than just labels on a map. They are linguistic echoes of the past, waiting to be understood through the gentle unveiling of Māori names.



In an incident packed Round 8 of the 2024/25 ABB FIA Formula E World Championship, Nick Cassidy finished tenth and scored an additional point for fastest lap at the Tokyo EPrix.

The Jaguar TCS Racing #37 of Nick Cassidy was promoted into the top 10 after Mahindra's Nyck de Vries received a time penalty for contact with Mitch Evans, with the subsequent damage meaning the Kiwi was unable to continue. The Jaguar TCS Racing #9 had looked set for a strong points finish before being spun into the barriers by the Dutchman, while teammate Cassidy showed searing pace in the closing stages after changing tyres during a red flag stoppage.

In a rainaffected Round 8, qualifying was cancelled due to the extreme adverse weather conditions, which meant the final classification from a disrupted FP2 determined the starting grid for the race. That left Nick starting in P13 and Mitch in P19.

The field set off behind the Safety Car to begin with to check conditions and suitability to start the race. As the weather improved the race began with a standing start. With mixed conditions on track, and Pit Boost creating an additional variable, there was a mix of strategies in the opening stages. Mitch climbed five places over two laps after taking his first fourminute Attack Mode. The race was red flagged on lap 13 after Maximillian Guenther stopped on track, with Mitch in P12 and Nick P16, the latter with both Attack Modes still to deploy.

As the race resumed, Mitch took his Pit Boost and second Attack Mode as he looked to make up further ground on the cars in front, but on lap 17 contact from de Vries spun the Jaguar TCS Racing #37 into the barriers. The Kiwi was able to briefly continue, but the resultant heavy damage to the rear of his Jaguar ITYPE 7 meant he was forced to retire three laps later.

Cassidy, after changing tyres during the red flag stoppage, began to show considerable pace and climb up the order, albeit with his mandatory Pit Boost stop still to take. After pitting from the lead having taken his first Attack Mode, the Kiwi rejoined in P12 and began to close on the cars ahead, still with one Attack Mode remaining.

Despite finishing less than a second off the top 10 on the road, Cassidy was promoted into the points following de Vries' time penalty.

The Tokyo EPrix resumes tomorrow (Sunday 18 May) for Round 9 of Formula E Season 11.

There are definitely some mixed feelings following today's race in Tokyo. Nick scoring two points, including taking the

fastest lap, is positive but only small consolation considering the strong pace he was showing in the closing stages after the red flag. Mitch had looked like banking a good haul of points with a possible top 6 finish through a mix of strong pace from the ninth row of the grid and some decisive strategy from the team. Being spun into the barriers by de Vries ruled out any chance of a strong result.

"We were heavily impacted by the cancellation of qualifying today but on a positive note Mitch and Nick's progress in the race and fastest lap shows that if we can start towards the front of the pack we are capable of a great result. We will be pushing hard tomorrow to ensure we leave the Tokyo EPrix with a strong result.



ON THE TRACK

Nick Cassidy was peerless in Round 11 of the 2024/25 ABB FIA Formula E World Championship in Shanghai, taking both pole position and the race win.

After severe wet weather conditions forced a race start behind the safety car following a 90minute delay, Cassidy's pace in the Jaguar ITYPE 7 #37 when racing began properly on lap eight – backed up by perfect team strategy – meant he was never headed and crossed the line more than seven seconds in front of the field.

Taking an early twominute Attack Mode on lap eight enabled Nick to build a comfortable lead ahead of Porsche's Pascal Wehrlein, the Porsche driver not able to close on Nick despite taking a fourminute attack mode at the same time. Nick continued to simply drive away from the field in his Jaguar ITYPE 7 which was also comfortably up on energy, and after taking his final sixminute Attack Mode on lap 22, Cassidy was never threatened.

Starting from P13 on the grid, Mitch Evans fought hard throughout the race but was unable to move forward into the points, finishing the race in P14.

I'm so proud of the team, this is a huge result for everyone's hard work and commitment. This season we've felt we've had the potential for some really great results, but they haven't come our way through no fault of our own at times. Even yesterday Nick was taken out when looking very strong, the same thing happened to Mitch in Tokyo, and there have been several other races where we deserved more.

But the team have dug deep and continued to work incredibly hard, so they really deserve this result. We know the Jaguar ITYPE 7 has fundamental pace, and today we've finally been able to capitalise on that with Nick's result. He was peerless today and has had pace in all conditions across the weekend as well. A clean sweep, fastest in FP3, pole position and untouchable in the race today – a race that he and the team executed perfectly from a strategic point of view as well. That's no mean feat in the conditions we had.

I feel for Mitch. With the grid penalties he had to take yesterday, this weekend was always going to be tough for him and today we couldn't find the balance in the car he needed. In wet conditions feel is everything for a driver, and Mitch just wasn't able to get the grip and confidence from the car he needed. But he fought hard, and as a team we'll do the same to ensure we work on this ahead of the next round in Jakarta.

The Jaguar TCS Racing #37 driver navigated his way through a closely fought second race of the Tokyo EPrix to climb six places and claim his third consecutive points finish.

Mitch Evans was unfortunately unable to take the start of the race following damage incurred after a crash in this morning's qualifying session. Though the team worked tirelessly to repair the car ahead of the race, there was not enough time to complete the work required.

Mitch and Nick were both in Group A for Qualifying, and following Mitch's incident Nick was also unable to make it through to the Duels, finishing just over two tenths off the top four fastest times and so started from the seventh row of the grid.

There were multiple changes of position in the opening stages, but Nick was able to stay with the leading group of cars prior to taking his first Attack Mode on lap 15. The Kiwi then efficiently moved up the order and by the end of his fourminute Attack Mode deployment on lap 18 was into P5.

After dropping to P9, the Jaguar TCS Racing #37 took his second Attack Mode deployment four laps later, but with all other cars ahead also taking their final Attack Mode the field was largely neutralised.

As the lead cars fought hard up ahead, Nick was able to capitalise and move up two further positions after contact between McLaren's Taylor Barnard and Mahindra's Edoardo Mortara led to the former crashing into retirement, while the latter received a time penalty for causing the collision. That incident brought out the Safety Car in the closing stages, but despite getting one final flying lap in to round off the 32lap race, Nick was unable to make up any more places.

Nick made brilliant progress through the field to climb six positions, but unfortunately just missing out on the Duels in qualifying meant he had a lot of progress to make to get up into the points paying positions. He did just that exceptionally well and he may have made up even more places without that late Safety Car period, but it wasn't to be.

"Mitch was pushing hard in qualifying which is exactly what we want our drivers to do, it was a very rare mistake and glad he was ok. Initially, we thought we'd have the car out - but ultimately there was just too much to do in the timeframe we had to get the Jaguar TCS Racing #9 race car ready. Noone is at fault here and I want to make it clear how proud I am of how both the team and Mitch handled this difficult situation."

"We know we haven't quite found the consistent speed in the Jaguar ITYPE 7 so far this season, but are taking plenty of learnings from every event and know the potential for strong performance is there. Our focus now switches to Shanghai, where we have happy memories after scoring a 13 last season, and we look forward to bouncing back strongly in China.


