Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc - was founded in 1969 by 19-year-old Murray Higgins, of Blockhouse Bay. The owner of a 1948 Mk IV, Murray placed an advertisement in the Public Notices section of the New Zealand Herald inviting Jaguar owners and enthusiasts to a meeting. The result on April 16 1969, was the formation of what is now known as the Jaguar Drivers' Club (Auckland) Inc.

The first event, on June 9 1969, was a fun rally and gymkhana, followed by lunch at the Puhoi Hotel (for the princely sum of \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children) and an evening "get together" in the Architects' Clubrooms on Symonds Street.

The Club has grown steadily since its humble beginnings and is now one of the largest single marque car clubs in Auckland. The Club's main aim is to foster interest in and promote owning, driving, maintaining and restoring Jaguar cars. To this end, a wide range of events are arranged on a monthly basis. Although some events are competitive, all are social and family and friends of members are welcome to join in.

Another important person in the Club's (and Jaguar's) history was Lofty England. Lofty, who managed Jaguar's successful competitions department in the 50's, was the Club's Patron until his death in 1995. Norm Dewis (Jaguar's chief test engineer 1952 to 1985) was Patron until his passing in 2019. The position of Patron is now being filled by Ian Callum (CBE). Ian was Jaguar's Design Director for 20 years and was instrumental in a full transformation of the saloons and sports cars, the launch of the SUVs, and the revolutionary I-Pace.

The Club's financial year is from August 1st to July 31st and the AGM is held on the 9th November 2025. New members will receive a copy of the current magazine which will give them a list of office holders (who are elected at each AGM). A copy of the Club's constitution can be found on the website: www.jaguardriversclub.co.nz.

Each major centre in NZ now has its own independent Jaguar car club, around 14 in all, ranging from the small with a dozen members up to Auckland with over 300.

A short history of Hobsonville

Before it became known as Hobsonville, the area was called 'Onekiritea' by the local Māori people, Ngati Whatua. This name referred to the clay soil found there, which they utilised for its pigment and as a natural soap.

The landscape remained unchanged until 1853, when the Crown acquired 600 acres on the peninsula. This marked a significant turning point, as the area was officially renamed 'Port Hobsonville' in honour of Captain William Hobson, who was the first Governor of New Zealand.

The records indicate that Governor Hobson's Government House was established in Auckland in 1841, utilising materials shipped from England. This structure, however, was not in Hobsonville and unfortunately met its demise when it burned down in 1848.

The primary development in the area after its renaming was the establishment of farming and later, clay works due to the local clay deposits.





A testament to the spirit of adventure in another day of our lives. The Mighty Waikato River, a serpent of mist and swirling Willow Wisps, of deep currents flowing beneath the overhanging trees. So many untold memories, tears and blessings mingle within her murky depths, drifting swiftly yet silently and just keeps on rolling along, beside the muddy banks of the infamous Mercer Landing.









SUNDAY DRIVE MERCER LANDING

Mercer Landing, 1863

The Waikato River had always dictated the rhythm of life for the Tainui Māori iwi who lived along its banks. But in July 1863, a different kind of rhythm began to beat at a strategic bend in the river, a place that would soon be known as Mercer Landing.

Before the soldiers arrived, it was a quiet spot, marked by the whisper of flax in the breeze and the distant call of a Pūkeko. Small canoes, carved from ancient totara, would glide silently by, their occupants fishing or travelling between Pa. The land was fertile, a patchwork of kauri forests and kumara fields, steeped in generations of stories and ancestral ties.

Then came the rumble of King George's Paddle Steamer 'Avon' and the arrival of General Cameron's forces. Their mission: to establish a foothold, a supply base for the inevitable push into the heart of the Waikato. The chosen site, with its deep-water access and commanding views, was perfect for their purpose.

The British invasion of the Waikato had begun, specifically aimed at crushing the power of the Kingitanga and acquiring its fertile lands for European settlement. Within weeks, a crude but effective landing stage took shape. Timber from the felled trees, iron hauled upriver, and the relentless toil of soldiers and labourers transformed the peaceful bend into a bustling, muddy hub.

Mercer Landing, though still raw and unfinished, was now a vital artery for the British campaign. It was a place of stark contrasts: the ancient rhythm of the river against the harsh pulse of military ambition, the whispers of the land against the shouts of command, it marked the beginning of a new, uncertain chapter, etched forever into the very mud of the Waikato.

- Ouais mes amis translates to "Yeah, my friends" in English. "Ouais" is a more informal way of saying "yes" (like 'yeah"), and "mes amis" means "my friends"
- cordon bleu faux pas can be understood as a culinary or social gaffe, combining the idea of a culinary "cordon bleu" (a master chef or an award for culinary excellence) with "faux pas" (a social blunder or mistake). Literally, it translates to "blue ribbon blunder," highlighting a mistake made by someone considered an expert or someone who should know better.
- Gastronomique translates to "gourmet" or "gastronomic" in English. It refers to something related to good food, fine dining, or the art of eating well.
- coup de grâce is a French phrase that translates to "stroke of grace" or "blow of mercy" in English. It refers to a final, decisive blow that puts an end to suffering, often used in the context of a merciful act of killing a mortally wounded person or animal. It can also be used figuratively to describe a final, decisive action that brings an endeavor to an end.
- amplement suffisant means "more than enough" or "ample" in English. It indicates that there is a sufficient quantity, and potentially even some extra, beyond what is needed.
- merci beaucoup means literally "thank you very much"
- voilà, bon appétit translates to "Here you go, enjoy your meal". "Voilà" can mean "here you go," "here it is," or "there you go," while "bon appétit" is a common expression wishing someone a good appetite.
- trés bien translates to "very well" or "very good"
- Sante and au revoir "Sante" (or "à votre santé") is used to say "cheers" or "to your health" when toasting, while "au revoir" means "goodbye".

History - The iron pipes of Pupuke Moana/Lake Pupuke

These iron pipes once helped supply most of the North Shore's

From 1894 until the 1950's, water was pumped from Lake Pupuke using steam engines and later electric pumps. The pumping equipment was kept in the brick buildings now used for The Pumphouse Theatre.

From here, a network of pipes took the water to reservoirs and to local businesses and households.

As the North Shore population grew, the lake could not supply enough water. Lake levels dropped and the water became contaminated. By the 1930's the water smelled "off" and in summer there were shortages.

This was solved when the old pumps were finally turned off and water was piped to the North Shore from the dams in the Waitakere Ranges.

1. Stunning Jaguar XJ220 Supercar Is Today's Bring a Trailer Find

The fastest production car in the world in its day, the XJ220 is a somewhat overlooked supercar today.

Launched almost immediately after World War II, Jaguar's original XK120 burst onto the scene as the world's fastest production car. Nearly a half-century later, with the likes of Porschand Ferrari wrestling over top-speed bragging rights, the XK220 grabbed the brass ring again, first running at just over 212 mph and then 217 mph. But while Stuttgart's 959 and Maranello's F40 are undisputed icons of their time, Jaguar's world-beater is somewhat overlooked. It shouldn't be.

Check out this example, up for sale on Bring a Trailer (which, like Car and Driver, is part of Hearst Autos). It's a 1993 Jaguar XJ220 in sumptuous Le Mans Blue, with impeccably low mileage. It has an unusual but pristine provenance, having spent a dozen years hanging out in the middle of a Tokyo skyscraper before being imported into Los Angeles and appearing on an episode of Jay Leno's Garage. It has certification from Jaguar's heritage operations, and the equivalent of just 5000 miles on

While it could be argued that British Racing Green is the signature color for an XJ220, Le Mans Blue both looks fantastic here and pays homage to Jaguar's heritage at France's greatest endurance race. In the 1950s, Jag's D-types were the apex predators at the Circuit de la Sarthe, and Jaguar was again on top in 1988, winning Le Mans with the V-12-powered XJR-9 the same year that the prototype XJ220 was revealed.

That prototype also featured 12-cylinder power, and here's where the XJ220 story stumbles a little. Instead of a V-12, the production cars got a twin-turbocharged 3.5-liter V-6. The engine had genuine rally-car heritage, and today, few people would complain about the V-6 in a Ferrari 296 GTB. But, in the early 1990s, six cylinders was a half dozen too few to be a

However, it was certainly powerful enough to beat Ferrari and Porsche. In this application, the twin-turbo V-6 makes 542

horsepower and 475 pound-feet of torque. Those are respectable figures today, and in a time when a 911 Turbo made do with nearly 200 fewer ponies, the XJ220 was a genuine monster. The transmission is a five-speed manual, sending power to the rear wheels only.

The production model was developed with veteran Jaguar racing firm Tom Walkinshaw Racing (TWR), which resulted in some hijinks. Looking for a test bed to sort out the Group B-spec V-6 for road use, TWR installed the engine in the middle of a Ford Transit that had formerly been used as a parts van by the Benetton F1 team. For many years afterward, this white Transit was a perennial crowd favorite at the Goodwood Festival of Speed, where it went up the hill at blistering pace, complete with a ladder strapped to the roof.

This XJ220's aluminum bodywork is considerably more elegant than a workaday Ford van's, and the design has aged beautifully. The staggered-width wheels are 17-inch up front and 18 inches in the rear, and the latter wear some seriously meaty Bridgestone Potenzas. Brakes are from AP Racing, with four-piston calipers at all four corners to shed that considerable top speed.

The gray interior is pure 1990s soft-edged design and comes with features including a trunk-mounted CD player for your UB40 and Peter Gabriel discs. While not quite as technologically advanced as the Porsche 959, the XJ220 is far more comfortable on the road than its F40 rival, and could conceivably be used as a Grand Tourer. Monterey's Car Week has just ended, but you could hardly do better than rolling up to next year's event in this car.

It's not the obvious vintage supercar choice, but it's a great one. The XJ220 possibly never got quite the respect it deserved when new, but it's a stunner with performance to match the looks. As Jaguar looks to rebrand, it would do well to remember machines like this.

It featured in the James Bond movie Spectre back in 2015, so why was the C-X75 prototype never put into production?

A hypercar to celebrate 75 years of Jaguar. A turbine powered engineering hammer blow to make the likes of Ferrari and Lambo look Victorian. Revealed in 2010, interest was high in the stunning Ian Callum design, so Jaguar set about putting it into limited production.

Did they build any?

Having decided using diesel fuelled turbines to make electricity for e-motors was a tad impractical, Jag got Williams Advanced Engineering to work up an alternative solution: a 1.6-litre turbo and supercharged 4cyl with e-boost to deliver 850bhp, 31 miles of EV running and a 200mph top speed.

It worked! We tested it and were wowed by the massive pace, but Jaguar got cold feet and canned the whole shebang.

Where are they now?

The prototypes were auctioned, and the design was recycled into a Bond villain car for 2015's Spectre. Since then one customer (at great expense) had his refinished with new paint and trim.

3. Jaguar Land Rover to cut up to 500 UK jobs

Jaguar Land Rover (JLR) is to cut up to 500 management jobs in the UK, as the carmaker faces pressure on sales and profits from US trade tariffs.

JLR said it would launch a voluntary redundancy scheme, and that the cuts were not expected to exceed 1.5% of its British workforce. The firm described the move as "normal business practice".

Last week, the carmaker revealed a drop in sales in the three months to June caused partly by it pausing exports to the US because of tariffs and also due to the planned wind-down of older Jaguar models.

The company warned last month that US President Donald Trump's decision to impose a 10% tariff on British cars exported to the US would hit its profits.

JLR said it "regularly offers eligible employees voluntary redundancy" and said the current programme was based on "the business's current and future needs".

It added that the UK-US trade deal on car imports gives it "confidence to invest £3.5bn" per year.

Car industry expert Professor David Bailey of the Birmingham Business School said the tariffs "play a big role" in the job cuts.

"It wasn't that long ago that JLR was reporting bumper profits - £2.5bn profit to the year ending in March - which was its best results in a decade," he told the BBC's Wake Up to Money programme.

The firm has also been taking on workers in preparation for producing more electric cars so the tariffs "have definitely had an impact", he said.

As part of a wave of tariff announcements made by Trump earlier this year, UK exports of UK cars and automotive parts faced an extra 25% tax, on top of an existing 2.5% levy. This led to JLR pausing shipments of its vehicles to the US.

However, the UK-US deal saw the tariff cut to 10% for a maximum of 100,000 UK cars, which matches the number of these vehicles that the UK exported last year.

Despite this, Prof Bailey said the new rate is still "a big increase" from the previous tariff of 2.5%, adding that one of its best selling cars, the Defender, is made in Slovakia and that still faces a 27.5% tariff.

David Jones, 45, and Jemma Foedisch, 42, both of Bell Way in Kingswood, Maidstone were arrested the same day and have now been charged with conspiracy to steal motor vehicles, receiving stolen goods and money laundering.

The pair will appear before Medway Magistrates' Court on 16 September.



Jaguar TCS Racing head into the season-finale weekend of the 2024/2025 ABB FIA Formula E World Championship determined to end on a high following a win each for drivers Mitch Evans and Nick Cassidy in Berlin last time out.





Jaguar TCS Racing head into the season-finale weekend of the 2024/2025 ABB FIA Formula E World Championship determined to end on a high following a win each for drivers Mitch Evans and Nick Cassidy in Berlin last time out.

The Kiwi duo are now on two victories apiece for Formula E Season 11, with Jaguar TCS Racing still the only team with both drivers to win a race in this campaign.

For Cassidy in particular, it promises to be a special weekend as it will be his last with Jaguar TCS Racing following two years during which, to date, he's scored 278 points for the team. That impressive points total includes four wins and a further seven podiums on the way, the last of those wins being an emphatic back-of-the-grid to victory drive in Berlin just over one week ago.

It will also be the last competitive weekend with Jaguar TCS Racing - the current FIA ABB Formula E Teams' World Champions - for Team Principal, James Barclay. To date, James has led the team to every one of its 125 race starts since its first competitive outing in 2016. Going into London, those 125 race starts have included 51 podiums, 12 poles and 20 wins - a number James and the team will be aiming to add to this weekend.

Jaguar I-TYPE 7 #9 driver, Mitch Evans, also comes into London having shown incredible form in Berlin where, in race one, he converted pole position into the race win despite extremely difficult wet conditions. It was Mitch's 14th career win in Formula E - all with Jaguar - and ties him for first place with Sébastien Buemi in the drivers' all-time win record standings.

The team's Berlin E-Prix double victory confirmed Jaguar TCS Racing has won at least four races for the fourth consecutive season. while Jaguar now leads the way for most race wins of any manufacturer (five) over the campaign. The 71 points scored in Berlin is also the highest race-weekend total ever for Jaguar TCS Racing, underlining the incredible positive momentum for the team coming into its home race - with wins in three out of the last four E-Prix.

It's undoubtedly going to be an emotional weekend for me in London. It's been an honour to have brought Jaguar back to motorsport and to have led this team from its very inception through to World Championship success last year. The team feels very much a part of me. It's the people in Jaguar TCS Racing that make it so special and I have no doubt that saying goodbye after London will be incredibly hard.
